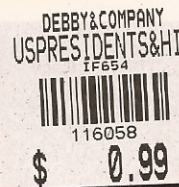

1492 - Christopher Columbus discovers New World.	1773 - <i>Boston Tea Party</i> is staged when colonists dump British tea into Boston Harbor.	1863 - <i>Emancipation Proclamation</i> declares all slaves freed from Confederate-held territory.
1497 - John Cabot makes first voyage to North America for England.	1774 - <i>Intolerable Acts</i> close Boston Harbor to punish colonists for <i>Boston Tea Party</i> ; <i>First Continental Congress</i> meets in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.	1865 - <i>Civil War</i> ends with Lee's surrender to Grant at Appomattox, Virginia; <i>13th Amendment</i> outlaws slavery throughout the United States.
1499 - Florentine merchant Amerigo Vespucci visits New World.	1775 - <i>Revolutionary War</i> begins; <i>Second Continental Congress</i> meets in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.	1867 - United States buys Alaska from Russia for \$7.2 million.
1507 - German mapmaker Martin Waldseemüller names New World <i>America</i> after Amerigo Vespucci.	1776 - <i>Declaration of Independence</i> is adopted; the United States of America is formed.	1868 - <i>14th Amendment</i> grants equality.
1513 - Juan Ponce de León discovers Florida.	1777 - <i>Articles of Confederation</i> are endorsed; Stars and Stripes flag is adopted; Washington's army winters at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.	1870 - <i>15th Amendment</i> guarantees most male citizens the right to vote.
1540 - Francisco Vásques de Coronado discovers the Grand Canyon while exploring the Southwest.	1780 - Pennsylvania becomes first state to abolish slavery.	1876 - Alexander Graham Bell invents the telephone.
1541 - Francisco Vásques de Coronado discovers the Mississippi River.	1781 - Last major battle of the <i>Revolutionary War</i> is fought between America and Britain in Yorktown, Virginia; <i>Articles of Confederation</i> take effect.	1877 - Thomas Edison invents the phonograph.
1565 - Spaniards establish St. Augustine, Florida, the first permanent European settlement in the United States.	1783 - <i>Revolutionary War</i> ends with the <i>Treaty of Paris</i> .	1879 - Thomas Edison invents the electric light bulb.
1585 - Sir Walter Raleigh establishes England's first American colony at Roanoke Island, off the coast of North Carolina.	1787 - <i>Constitution</i> is written by Founding Fathers.	1898 - <i>Spanish-American War</i> is fought.

1620 - Pilgrims establish <i>Plymouth Colony</i> at Plymouth, Massachusetts — the second permanent British settlement in America — and draw up <i>Mayflower Compact</i> .	1793 - Congress passes a fugitive slave law requiring the return of runaway slaves.	1917 - United States enters <i>World War I</i> .
1636 - Harvard — the first college in the colonies — is established.	1798 - Georgia becomes the last state to abolish slavery.	1918 - <i>Armistice Day</i> ends <i>World War I</i> .
1647 - Massachusetts establishes the first colonial public school system.	1800 - Washington, D.C. becomes the national capital.	1929 - Stock Market crashes; <i>Great Depression</i> begins.

1752 - Benjamin Franklin flies a homemade kite during a storm, proving that lightning is a form of electricity.	1823 - <i>Monroe Doctrine</i> warns Europeans against interfering in Western Hemisphere affairs.	1957 - <i>Vietnam War</i> begins.
1754 - <i>French and Indian War</i> begins.	1835 - Samuel F. B. Morse invents the telegraph; Erie Canal opens.	1962 - <i>Cuban Missile Crisis</i> takes place.
1763 - <i>French and Indian War</i> ends with the <i>Treaty of Paris</i> .	1846 - <i>Mexican War</i> begins.	1964 - <i>Civil Rights Act of 1964</i> allows all people to be served in restaurants, hotels, and businesses.
1765 - British Parliament passes <i>Stamp Act</i> , taxing newspapers, legal documents, and other printed materials in the colonies.	1848 - <i>Mexican War</i> ends with <i>Treaty of Guadalupe-Hidalgo</i> ; discovery of gold in California triggers the <i>Gold Rush</i> .	1969 - On July 20, Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin of Apollo XI become first men to walk on the moon.
1770 - British troops kill five American civilians in the <i>Boston Massacre</i> .	1856 - America's first kindergarten opens in Watertown, Wisconsin.	1972 - Congress passes <i>Equal Rights Amendment</i> .
	1858 - <i>Lincoln-Douglas Debates</i> focus on slavery.	1975 - <i>Vietnam War</i> ends with the surrender of South Vietnam to North Vietnam.
